

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# Board's Eye View Run the Green Plag

#### Ahoy there, Maties!

So, OK, 2022 was another strange year. We were no sooner coming out of Covid lockdowns than we found that Russia's war in Ukraine, UK political turmoil, materials shortages and rising costs all conspired to make it another challenging 12 months. Despite all of this, it has been a good year for Westpark. After delays due to covid and later by a shortage of materials, we are pleased to report that the longawaited improvements to the play area in the park have now been completed. The sand pit has been enhanced with a new pirate ship; there are new swings and other features including the re-opening of the pass under the bridge have now been completed.

## Run the Green Flag up the Flagpole!

Congratulations to Pippa and the Darlington Borough Council team together with our volunteers and friends who have, once again, achieved the prestigious Green Flag Award for Westpark in 2022. Standards for the award are high, there are only about 2000 in the whole of the country and South Park is the only other in Darlington. The judges were impressed with the condition, standards, management plan, commitment and community support for our park. So, well done us!



Take Notice!

#### Also this year saw the installation of the noticeboards, designed by Stephen Pardue, around the park.

Made from weathered corten steel, to match other installations in the park, each of the 5 noticeboards, built in the shape of a curled beech leaf, contains a laser-cut pattern of a tree. This allows air to pass through the design without creating too much stress during heavy winds. Also each features a unique enamelled panel celebrating an element of our local heritage, linked to the themes of our street names. Temporary inserts have been produced to line the inside of the noticeboard area, while we await production of the final artwork

inserts designed following workshops with children at West Park Academy and residents as part of our Platinum Jubilee celebrations.

We also benefitted from Levy Trust funds which was spent on purchasing additional wildflower seed and spring bulbs over and above the allocation from Darlington Borough Council.

Despite periods of drought in the summer, and late germination for some of the seeds, the various seed mixes have provided great displays of colour and scent for people and a super source of food for the insects, pollinators and birds within the park.





It was great to see so many local street parties over the Jubilee Weekend. The Trust was successful in bidding for a grant from the Arts Council's Let's Create Jubilee Fund, which paid for various activities including poetry workshops for local children and residents, led by Teesside poet, Ann Cuthbert and print-making activities with artist Adrian Moule.



Platinum Jubilee 2022

This Jubilee Art in the Park programme culminated on Sunday 5th June with our Platinum Jubilee Picnic in the Park, where over 300 people, despite the well-dodgy weather, attended to celebrate the late Queen's royal achievements.

Tees' poet Ann Cuthbert was there to read poems written by local children, residents and herself. You can read one of the childrens' poems on our back page and you can read one of Ann's poems "Your Westpark" on page 18. Other attractions included free face painting and Jamie Stewart, The Bubble Whisperer, together with the chance to spend some time in quiet reflection walking the Rekalibrator, a mindfulness rope labyrinth, assembled by David Spence and his colleagues.

# Planned Works & Maintenance

In the coming months, Levy funds will be used as part of the ongoing maintenance of the park.

Work will include the replacement of fences and fence posts, where required, though some replacement posts won't be needed in areas where vegetation and shrubs have filled the spaces and now create a natural barrier. Repair and maintenance work is also scheduled to restore paths in the park which have been affected by heavy rains. Various drainage projects to protect the paths and prevent some of the larger (dog-friendly?...) puddles from forming are also due to take place in the coming year.

#### This year we are allocating funds to support a number of activities and events.

One of these is to fund a 'feasibility study' to explore the possibility of a community centre. At recent meetings there has been considerable support for this. There is an area of land at the western end of the new phase which has been identified as suitable. It is likely it will share parking space with a

propsed new GP practice surgery which is currently also under consideration. Trustees are keen to discover what people would like from such a community facility. 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## FROM CHEMICALS TO COMMUNITY

#### **CARING • SHARING • DARING**


It's taken 20 years but the Westpark Estate is now completed and close to being fully occupied.

Since planning permission was granted in 2002, Bussey and Armstrong have transformed this, once derelict, eyesore of a 'Chemical Works' into a proper community with around 700 new homes, ranging from one / two bed apartments to two, three and four bedroom starter and family homes. Bussey and Armstrong have also partnered with Bernicia and Railway Housing Association (our relationship with which goes back nearly 100 years) to provide affordable housing for shared sale or rent and have over 120 apartments for rent in Catcastle, Chaldron, Elizabeth & Belah Court and at Tillage Green.

## You're part of something pretty amazing.

Westpark Village Centre, which includes West Park Academy, The White Heifer That Travelled pub & Kid's 1st Children's Nursery were completed in 2007 with the M&S Foodhall and flagship Aldi stores following in 2017.

Architecturally, the estate reflects the Arts & Crafts style using good quality locally sourced materials put together by our own craftsmen. While we have several long service employees (the record is 70 years) some of our our people have only ever worked for us at Westpark yet still have 20 years service! The Art Strategy which we implemented for Westpark is also nearing completion with the final street signs now being installed. You will find the final street map on our website and copies are available free of charge from our Sales Centre at 90 Collingsway.



Across the road (that is, across Edward Peaseway) at Westpark Garden Village, we have started development of four / five bedroom homes at Juniper Avenue to complement and add variety to those being offered by our partner developers, Gentoo, Thirteen & Cussins Homes. Green links are being provided both through and around the housing which, as with Westpark, will include artworks, bespoke signage and exercise & play facilities designed to extend and improve the use of the open spaces. The Art Strategy had again been created with Bill Herbert with street names that reflect the theme of Yielding Wielding Shielding. If you live in one of these homes, you

may wonder where the street names were derived from. To help you we have commissioned a new street map which will explain the background of the themes used which are Archaeology & The Teesdale Assemblage, Charles Dickens & the Arts and The Mines and Dams of Upper Teesdale & Weardale.

At the Friends' of Westpark meeting in March, participants were introduced to Caroline Mackenzie from Cleveland Orienteering Klub (CloK)(sic) who told us that the club (or should that be the Klub?) had received funding from Sports England to create some new orienteering courses throughout the area which would incorporate a new orienteering app.

The offer was open to Westpark and it was decided at the meeting to accept and in June a new series of orienteering points were installed complete with QR codes and a microchip linking to the app. Each of the 20 posts features a 'brass rubbing' metal image funded from our successful bid to the Arts Council. 






#### Ann Cuthbert

further, we will form a special task and finish group to begin to raise the money and support from a range of sources e.g. National Lottery; Local Authority; Tees Valley Combined Authority; County Durham Community Foundation etc. We will also produce a business case to ensure that as a community we will be able to support the ongoing running of any such facility. But at this stage we are only seeking ideas and a sense of who and how we might use a 'community centre'.
